Message from the Commander

In this edition of the newsletter, I hope to explain some of the administrative differences among the four services assigned to JCU. Often, families may not understand why unit members are compensated differently for similar duties. Many, if not all of the inconsistencies, stem from service (Army, Marine, Navy, Air Force) decisions on tour length, promotion rates, bonuses or special pays.

I'd like to keep everyone forever, but some services view an extended tour in one location as undesirable to the service and the individual. Each of the four services permits their respective service members to stay in this Joint assignment for varying tour lengths. A Joint coded assignment is a mandatory three year tour. This directive applies to the officers in the unit. The command has negotiated longer tours for the enlisted members in order to benefit from the training and experience received in JCU. While Army, Navy, and Air Force members will stay a minimum of four years, the Marines in JCU will stay with us for at least five years. Extensions beyond this initial tour vary with service. As most unit members notice, an extended tour in JCU is beneficial to a Soldier. But conventional wisdom for other services considers a tour of more than 5-6 years to reflect adversely on the individual. Recently, the Navy has gone so far as to limit JCU Sailors to a maximum of six years, nonnegotiable, during any single tour.

monetary compensation from their parent service. Pay and allowances are governed by the service and cannot be adjusted by the unit – not even SOCOM. For example, some service members receive bonuses for their specific specialty while other persons, even in the same service, don't receive that bonus even though everyone is doing similar work while in JCU. The service has made a decision to compensate certain skills differently for numerous reasons. This thought process extends to Special Duty Assignment Pay and other allowances authorized in JCU. The services have set a specific level that cannot be adjusted within a Joint organization to match that of other services.

Each service promotes its members at various rates. Some services require a written test while others do not. The parent service determines timelines for promotion eligibility in order to balance grades throughout an entire service. JCU members typically are promoted ahead of their peers, but that stems from the quality of the individual hired into the unit. They are still promoted within the procedures of their service. Although they should, they don't receive extra points for being in JCU. The Army is one service that recognizes the importance of JCU. Army graduates in the rank of Sergeant (E5) may be promoted to Staff Sergeant (E6) once successfully completing SOROC.

Processes for award approval are different for all four services. The differences here stem from service decisions to delegate responsibilities for granting levels of awards. For a majority of the Joint and Army awards received by unit members, authority has been granted to a local Army General Officer so award approval is rather quick and straight to the point. The process differs for a Sailor, Airmen, or Marine warranting recognition for wartime service or achievement. Under these circumstances, the awards must be routed to the respective service headquarters taking many months for approval of these awards.

We raise these differences in many forums. The process for approval is long and circuitous. Issues route through SOCOM in Tampa, Florida who then must coordinate with each service individually.

The intent of this letter is to inform you of the differences that do indeed exist among the four services in JCU – as many of you already realized. Each service provides benefits to its members that can't be found in another branch of service. For example, slower promotions in one branch are compensated by M the payment of higher bonuses in another service. As I tell each new hire to JCU, be proud of where you came from. Your branch is doing what is right for the good of the entire service. The strength of JCU is the differing backgrounds of its members and families. Please ask me any questions, anytime.




