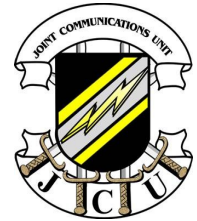

It is close to the anniversary of the tornadoes that touched so many lives in Fayetteville and the surrounding area last year. Please make sure you read the information provided below to ensure you and your families are prepared for any emergency that may occur.

What is a tornado?

A tornado is a violent windstorm characterized by a twisting, funnel shaped cloud. It is produced by a thunderstorm and formed when cool air overrides a layer of warm air, forcing the warm air to rise rapidly.

If the weather looks threatening, turn on a TV or radio. What is the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning?

The National Weather Service issues a tornado watch when tornadoes are possible in your area. Be alert for approaching storms. This is a good time to remind family members where the safest places within your home are located. Listen to the radio or television for further developments. A tornado warning is issued when a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. If a tornado warning is issued and the sky becomes threatening, move to your designated place of safety. Turn on a battery-operated radio and wait for further instructions.

When is tornado season?

Tornado season is generally March through August, although tornadoes can occur at any time of the year.

Is there a time of day when tornadoes usually happen?

Yes, tornadoes tend to occur in the afternoons and evenings. More than 80 percent of all tornadoes strike between noon and midnight.

What are some tornado danger signs?

Dark, often greenish sky, wall cloud, large hail, and a loud roar, similar to a freight train.

Are there other signs I should look for?

Some tornadoes appear as a visible funnel extending only partially to the ground. Look for signs of debris below the visible funnel. Before a tornado hits, the wind may die down and the air may become very still. An approaching cloud of debris can mark the location of a tornado even if a funnel is not visible. Tornadoes generally occur near the trailing edge of a thunderstorm. It is not uncommon to see clear, sunlit skies behind a tornado.

Things to do now

If you have a storm shelter, register its location with the City.

Registering your shelter's location will let rescue workers know you have a shelter and where to find it if a disaster covers it with debris. Call the **Action Center** at 405-297

-2535 to register your shelter.

Talk about tornadoes with your family. Designate an area in your home as a shelter, and regularly practice having your family go there as if there were a tornado. Make sure your family knows the difference between a "tornado watch" and a "tornado warning."

Have disaster supplies on hand.

Flashlight and extra batteries (do not use candles or open flame devices!) . Portable, battery operated radio and extra batteries First aid kit and manual Emergency food and water Non-electric can opener, essential medicines, cash and credit cards. Sturdy shoes, a set of spare keys to vehicles, personal identification Camera with several rolls of film (for documenting your damage)

Develop an emergency communications plan.

Have a plan for getting back together in case family members are separated from one another during a tornado. Ask an out-of-state relative or friend to act as the family contact. After a disaster, it's often easier to call long distance. Make sure everyone in the family knows the name, address and phone number of the contact person.

When it's on the way

When a tornado is coming, you have a short amount of time to make life or death decisions. Advance planning and quick response are the keys to surviving.

If you are at home:

Go to the basement, storm cellar, or the lowest level of the building. If there is no basement, go to an inner hallway or a small inner room without windows, such as a bathroom or closet. Get away from windows. Go to the center of the room. Stay away from corners because they tend to attract debris. Get under a piece of sturdy furniture such as a workbench or heavy table and hold on to it. Use your arms to protect your head and neck.

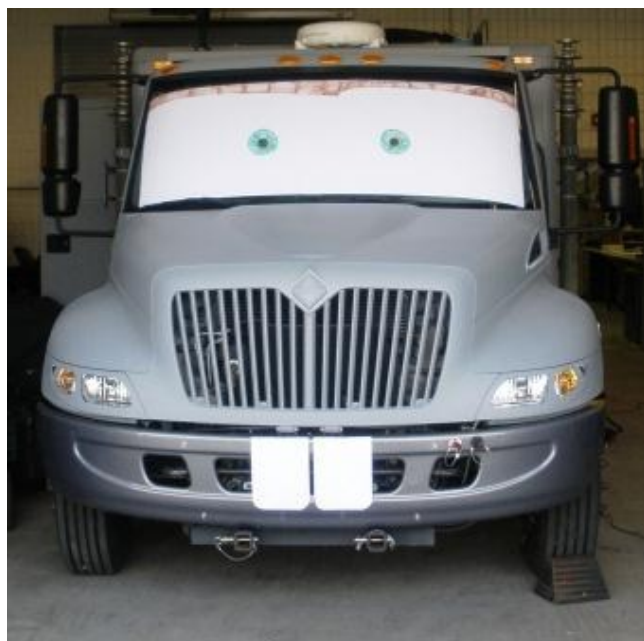

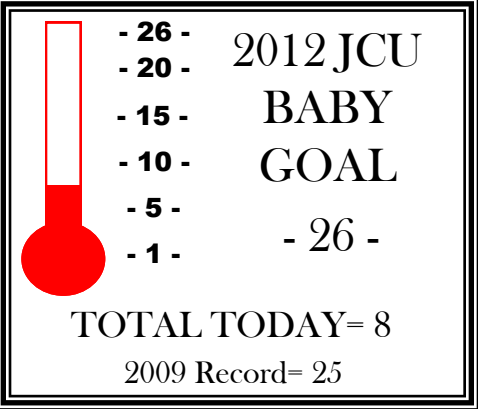

SOCA Scholarship

To the members and families of JCU, I am pleased to announce one of the many initiatives that the Special Operations Communicators Association (SOCA) started four years ago, The Annual Special Operations Communicators Association Scholarship. SOCA will offer three college scholarships for full time college students, valued at \$500 each, to deserving spouses and college-aged child dependents of a current JCU Military or Civil Service Civilian Unit Member. Applicants are asked to submit an essay on the topic below, to SOCA's Board of Officers. The Board of Officers will select from all of the qualified entries to award the three \$500 scholarships. It is SOCA's goal to show their appreciation to those who contribute and sacrifice so much in support of our Country's National Objectives. SOCA thanks the members of JCU and your families for all that you do.

Criteria for award:

- Spouse must be a full-time college student (sporadic continuing education classes will not suffice)
- Child must be a full-time college student. If a graduating High School Senior, student must have declared enrollment into a selected college.
- If scholarship is awarded and either the spouse or child drops out of said college, the entire amount of the award is to be turned back into SOCA for re-issuance to another applicant.
- When available, the winners for this year's awards will be required to take a presentation photo with the SOCA President and authorize the posting of their essay to the JCU website for publicity purposes.
- Scholarship check will be directly mailed to the college registrar's office in your name.

Applicants must submit a 1-2 page essay on the below topic to SOCA's Board of Officers on our website at www.thesoca.org. Once on the site, select the Scholarship tab, read the header and then fill out the application. Be sure to have your essay ready before you start filling out the application, you will be required to paste it in the block provided. Also have your last transcript in a digital format ready to attach it in the block provided. SOCA's Board of Officers will select from all of the qualified entries to award the three \$500 scholarships. Entries must be received by July 1, 2012. The winners will be notified by July 15, 2012 and announced in the August Edition of Delivering the Message.
