Heating, Ventilation & Air Conditioning, Generator, AT-V/MRZR, and standard use vehicles; as well as providing Operator level training on those systems. If it heats, cools, rolls, runs, provides electricity; is made of metal, wood, fiberglass, rubber, or acrylic: the MMS team can cut, weld, fix, fabricate, insulate, or burn it to make it work better, stronger, faster. All while providing a professional finished product with some paint, stain, and powder coat. The limits have yet to be established.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER – JULY 2019

Summer in America, a great time of year in our country. The weeks leading up to July 4th are a time of vacations, beach trips, festivals, fireworks and a fourday! What could be better?

During this time of year there is always the mention of that great American principle, that one thing we Americans hold dear in our hearts. The reason for the missions. FREEDOM. Lee Greenwood expressed it well when he wrote, "I'm proud to be an American, where at least I know I'm free." Freedom is the essence of our nation.

While I don't have the answers to the things that keep us from being truly free, I can say this. The things that keep you bound up, that have control over you... do not have to continue. You can break free from those things... but not on your own. You need help. The first step is to admit that you are bound. Then reach out to someone you trust can help.

Supervisors are reminded that a 96-hour pass is the maximum authorized for military personnel, unless service member is taking leave. During this time period, civilian personnel must be on an approved leave status if not reporting for full duty days. **Denotes Federal Holidays.

Non-use of Seat Belts/ **Restraint Systems**

71% of military vehicle occupant fatalities were not using seat belts/ restraint systems. Of those, all but one of the occupants using a seat belt/ restraint survived. Of the five vehicle mishaps that involved occupant fatalities to date in FY19, six of six fatalities were not wearing seat belts/restraints.*

The Fix:

- Enforce use of seat belts/restraints.
- Emphasize use of seat belts/restraints in mission briefings
- Conduct thorough pre-combat checks

Faulty Mission Planning

Poor mission planning (rehearsal not conducted for that event, inadequate pre-mission briefings and orders, troop leading procedures not done, executed poorly, etc.) contributed to 79% of the mishaps.**

- Rehearsal not conducted for that event
- Inadequate pre-mission briefings and orders
- Troop leading procedures not done or executed poorly

The Fix:

- Conduct rehearsals, thorough briefings, pre-combat checks/inspections
- Incorporate mission planning and risk mitigation into every aspect of unit operations
- -Reassess risk if the mission changes
- -Leader presence

Lack of mission planning and the application of risk

cause of on-duty mishay

Deficient Driver Training

Unit driver training programs were substandard (no program existed, programs were pencil whipped or fabricated, drivers were not trained on the specific vehicle variant or for conditions, etc.) in 67% of the units investigated.**

- No program existed
- Programs were pencil whipped or fabricated
- Drivers were not trained on the specific vehicle variant or for conditions

The Fix:

- Use your master drivers
- Review and validate your driver training programs
- Select the right Soldiers for training
- Train and license your Soldiers on all pieces of equipment they are required to operate

Inadequate Leader Engagement

A leader failed to correct a deficiency or standards violation in 75% of mishaps.**

- Seat belts/vehicle restraints
- Excessive speed
- Unauthorized sleeping areas

The Fix:

- Leader knowledge
- Leader presence
- Leader gumption

Deadly Weekends

More than 55% of indiscipline-related mishaps occurred between 1700 Friday and 0500 Monday.***

The Fix:

- Conduct face-to-face counseling with subordinates
- Ask questions like, "What are your plans this weekend?"
- Encourage use of the buddy system
- Use ARAP to its full potential

Poor Decisions

Driver mistakes (excessive speed, fatigue, etc.) contributed to 47% of the Class A mishaps.***

- Excessive speed
- Fatigue

The Fix:

- Identify Soldiers who display poor driving skills
- Coach and mentor your Soldiers teach them how to manage off-duty risk
- Make discussions about safety and loss prevention personal

Deliberate Misconduct

- Driver misconduct (drinking and driving, failure to wear seat belts, etc.) contributed to 42% of the Class A mishaps.***
- Drinking and driving
- Failure to wear seat belts

The Fix:

*Based on available data for all on-duty Class A mishaps within a five-year period. ** Based on on-duty vehicle mishaps investigated by the USACRC within a five-year period.

*** Based on analysis of indiscipline-related PMV mishaps within a five-year period.

- Identify Soldiers who exhibit high-risk behavior
- Make discussions about safety and loss prevention personal
- Use Preliminary Loss Reports and other examples to drive home the hazards associated with off-duty driving

Safety Culture

Unit safety culture impacts readiness, which ARAP provides a way to measure.

- Units with ARAP scores in the bottom 25% have four times as many Class A mishaps as units with scores in the top half
- Units not current or never enrolled had more mishaps than those in the bottom 25%

- It's not about the score - it's the culture the score represents

- Don't just take the test again. Work on the culture in your unit
- Have your unit take the survey to get information to improve your safety culture
- Implement actions to enhance safety practices and then conduct a follow-on survey
- Communicate your plan down to the lowest level

Leaders are not stepping up ar making vital on-the-spot correction hat prevent unnecessary mishaps.
